





The Last Gospel - During Advent and Christmas, we read from the Prologue to John's Gospel following the Post-Communion Prayer. This stems from the Medieval tradition of reading John 1 at the conclusion of every Mass. According to our adaptation of this tradition, in Advent, the reading ends with light shining in the darkness; it is extended in the season of Christmas with the Word becoming Flesh.

Music Minute - Today we hear an organ work by Ulysses Kay, whose musical education was shaped by a diverse collection of influences. First pointed toward music at age six by his uncle King Oliver, the trumpeter who mentored Louis Armstrong, Kay developed relationships with William Grant Still and Paul Hindemith during studies at the University of Arizona, Eastman, Yale, and Columbia. Characterizing his overall style as "lyrical," Kay used no shortage of dissonance but did not incorporate serialist techniques, and his works earned him a slew of fellowships, awards, and other accolades during his career. Kay's perception of his art changed during his life, exemplifying the nuanced ways in which people negotiate racial identities through music. For most of his career, he wanted to be seen in non-racialized terms—a composer, not a Black composer. As musicologist Emily Abrams Ansari has written, Kay sought to effect this "by repeatedly denying the influence of race upon his music; by avoiding racial referents in title choices and stylistic decisions; and by resisting racial typecasting by accentuating his individuality as a composer." This connected to his aesthetic views, as recalled by his daughter Virginia: "Through most of his career the idea of art and expression for its own sake—for the music itself—was the ideal." Musicians of this period often insisted that art can and should exist autonomously, in isolation from the political, social, and embodied contexts in which it is made. Ultimately, however, Kay's experiences of the civil rights movement, in particular his wife Barbara's political activism, drew him away from the de-politicized frameworks of modernism. "Towards the end of his career," observed his daughter, "he was very clear that [his music] was African-American in so far as it was his creation." In her view, this shift crystallized in the operatic corner of the composer's oeuvre. Where he had previously set libretti that were based on works by Chekhov and Twain, each of Kay's last two operas, Jubilee (premiered 1976) and Frederick Douglass (premiered 1991), followed the experiences of enslaved (then freed) people during and after their enslavement.
